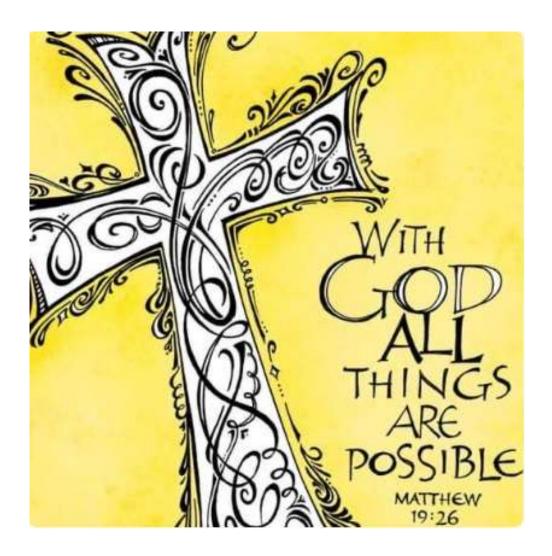

# CONGREGATIONAL MEETING JUNE 9, 2024

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## Annual Report of the Pastor FY 2023-2024

Dear Members of Advent Lutheran Church,

As we reflect on the 2023-2024 fiscal year, I am grateful for the opportunity to share how we have fulfilled our mission together. Here is an overview of our activities and achievements, organized according to the responsibilities outlined in my letter of call.

#### Preach and Teach the Word of God

Throughout the year, I have been committed to preaching and teaching the Word of God in accordance with the Holy Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions. Weekly sermons and Bible studies have provided our congregation with spiritual nourishment and a deeper understanding of our faith. Additionally, our midweek Lenten series, conducted in collaboration with Pastor Steve Wachtman, Vicar Jaren Summers, and the congregation at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, offered a unique opportunity for shared learning and fellowship.

#### Administer Holy Baptism and Holy Communion

Administering the sacraments is a central part of our worship life. I have presided over numerous baptisms and communion services, ensuring that these sacraments remain a cornerstone of our faith practice. Teaching and presiding over the Confirmation program and service is something I enjoy very much. When our Confirmation Students are in 8th grade, they will have had three years of instruction with me and stand ready to affirm their baptisms and make a public declaration of their faith in Jesus Christ.

#### **Lead Us in Worship**

Leading worship has been a joy and privilege. Our regular Sunday services, along with special services such as our annual Drive-Up Ashes, Blessing of the Animals, Old Time Gospel Sunday, midweek Lenten, and Holy Week services, have provided diverse opportunities for worship and reflection. The Drive-Up Ashes ministry, with participation from 75-100 cars, continues to be a powerful outreach to our community. Our weekly Wednesday services at the Forum have been particularly meaningful, with an average attendance of 20-30 people, supported by the musical talents and selfless giving of our Director of Music, Jean Pontious.

#### **Proclaim the Forgiveness of Sins**

Proclaiming the forgiveness of sins is fundamental to our ministry. Through Word and Sacrament, we have emphasized God's grace and the assurance of forgiveness made possible by God's grace through faith in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus (Ephesians 2). This year brought a difficult situation that called us to look deeply into what it means to forgive and to be forgiven. Despite the gravity of the situation involving a long-time valued staff member, forgiveness was extended, affirming that God's grace and love remain steadfast. This approach not only upheld our commitment to accountability but also reinforced our dedication to the principles of mercy and reconciliation. I want to personally thank Brent Welch, Bob Goldie, and Trevor Downing for their support and leadership during this time.

#### **Provide Pastoral Care**

Pastoral care has been a vital aspect of this year in ministry. I have had the honor of presiding over several funerals and weddings, offering support and comfort during these significant life events. Serving as Chaplain for Camp Luther at HopeWood Shores also allowed me to extend pastoral care to the camp community. I have visited with those who attend the Forum services while in the hospital and other rehab facilities. I have made numerous Home Communion, hospital, and end-of-life calls. The reach of pastoral care this past year also included texts, emails, and messages via social media platforms. There have been many prayers prayed, tears shed, and encouragement given, together.

#### Speak for Justice and Work on Behalf of the Poor and Oppressed

Our commitment to social justice has been reflected in our various outreach initiatives and my involvement in the Southern Ohio Synod Stewardship and Outside the Box Team. These roles have enabled us to advocate for justice and support those in need. We have given much needed funding to LSS Food Pantries (especially through the Thanksgiving Ingathering and Souper Bowl of Caring efforts), help for HopeWood Outdoors, and the monthly work of the Bed Brigade. We have collected school supplies, backpacks, hats, and mittens for children. And we held our 29<sup>th</sup> annual Blessing of the Animals, which serves as a blessing to the pets and owners attending as well as to other animals via donated pet food items.

#### **Encourage Vocations and Ministry Preparation**

Matthew 9:37-38 says, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

Encouraging individuals to prepare for ministry has been a focus for me in my 18 years of ministry and it is **vital** for Advent to continue to be a teaching and learning congregation.

Like many denominations of Christianity the ELCA is suffering a pastoral shortage. At our latest Synod Assembly (June 1, 2024) it was reported that in the next 18 months of the ~9,000 total rostered leaders, 1,000–1500 will retire in the next two years and only 400 projected Seminary graduates. In 2023 500 first call churches were available and only 170 pastors were ready to be placed.

A recent USA Today article states that clergy across the nation are increasingly struggling with mental health issues due to heavy workloads and the divisive political climate. Many are finding it difficult to cope with the pressures of their roles, leading to a rise in stress and burnout among religious leaders. That's the difficult news. Here's the good news. God is still in charge.

I am pleased to report that Advent's former LIC Student, **Jaren Summers**, was approved for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament in the ELCA and graduated with his Master of Divinity degree from Trinity Lutheran Seminary at Capital University. He is now interviewing and awaiting a call to serve a congregation. Once that call is extended he will be ordained.

I am also pleased to report that current member and past Digital Content Manager, **Tony Maggio**, completed his first of four years of seminary at Trinity Lutheran Seminary at Capital University. Tony was awarded the James L. Schaaf Memorial Award for Excellence in Church History during TLS' baccalaureate worship service this past May. He is currently doing his Clinical Pastoral

Experience (CPE) 10-week rotation at Nationwide Children's Hospital, where he serves as a Chaplain and Chaplain On-Call, a requirement for Master of Divinity students and those seeking ordination into the Ministry of Word and Sacrament (Pastor) in the ELCA.

Amy Lytle, longtime member and current Church Council Secretary, has been attending the Southern Ohio Leadership Academy, which is a ministry of the Synod that seeks to form and prepare lay leaders for service in the congregations of the Southern Ohio Synod. These lay leaders may be either a Lay Worship Leader (LWL) or a Synod Authorized Minister (SAM). I am pleased to report that Amy is now an LWL and well on her way to becoming a SAM. What's the difference between these two?

The Lay Worship Leader Program of the Southern Ohio Synod forms, evaluates, and prepares candidates to be certified and sent into ministry to provide occasional worship leadership and preaching to congregations and worshiping communities across the Synod.

The Synod Authorized Minister (SAM) Program of the Southern Ohio Synod forms, evaluates, and prepares candidates to be certified and sent into ministry to meet congregational needs for sacramental worship and pastoral leadership in ongoing service to congregations and worshiping communities where the placement of ministers of word and sacrament is impractical or where pastors are not readily available.

Please pray for the Christian church universal and specifically the ELCA as we strive to raise up called and gifted people to serve the church in a vocational setting.

#### Impart Knowledge of the ELCA and its Wider Ministry

Through my service on the Synod Stewardship and Outside the Box teams, a member of the HopeWood Outdoors Board, and ELCA's Youth Ministry Network E-Team that specializes in electronic communication, graphic design, video, and photography, as well as participation in other ELCA-related activities - locally, regionally, and nationally - I have imparted knowledge about our wider church and its ministries in emails, teaching, worship, and personal interactions. This has helped increase our congregation's awareness and support of God's Work being done through our hands and the broader work of the ELCA.

#### **Equip Us for Witness and Service**

Equipping our congregation for witness and service has been a priority, as you can see by my reporting thus far. Our VBS program, Live Nativity, and collaborative Lenten series and other fellowship events have strengthened our community bonds and commitment to service.

Through worship, education, and outreach programs, I have sought to empower each member to live out their faith in tangible ways. If you would like to talk to me more about this subject, please contact me as I would very much like to meet with you!

#### **Guide Us in Proclaiming God's Love**

Guiding our congregation in proclaiming God's love through word and deed has been at the heart of all our activities. Whether through worship, pastoral care, team, staff, and council meetings, or community outreach (i.e. Drive-Up Ashes, Live Nativity, Thanksgiving Ingathering, Bed Brigade, Souper Bowl of Caring, etc.), we have strived to be a beacon of God's love in our community.

#### **Looking Ahead**

The fiscal year ahead is filled with promise. We are discerning, discussing, and praying over our staffing needs. Our worship life remains robust, and our adult education and fellowship programs are thriving. While our youth ministry faces challenges, we are blessed with dedicated parents and supporters who are committed to nurturing our young members. I want to thank Marcy Layne, Angie Soltesz, Jean Pontious, Courtney Crum, and Stacy Bolzenius for their help and leadership with our educational ministries. I thank every single church council member, team leader, team member, parent, individual, youth, visitor, and staff member for the gift of their presence among us. I am blessed by every one of you in some way, as I hope, pray, and strive to be a blessing to you.

#### Call to Action

As we move forward, I urge you to continue praying for Advent Lutheran Church. Your consistent involvement in worship and other ministries is crucial. The giving of your time, talents, and treasures serves as nourishment for our common life. Remember, when worship ends, the service begins. I look forward to our walk together as we continue to worship God, follow Jesus, serve others, and make disciples at the corner of God, Government, and Golf.

## **SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT 2023-2024**

- Jean Pontious, Courtney Crumb, Matt Pittman, Stacy Bolzenius and Marcy Layne teachers
- The PreK-5th grade:
  - Used "Dig In" curriculum for Pre-K through 5th grade. We studied the "Life of Jesus". The lessons were well received and focused on Bible stories with a variety of activities.
  - There were between four to nine children each week all in the same class. This grouping seemed to work well.
- The Confirmation Class

#### Y2 Youth

- Y2 continued to meet monthly with a variety of activities including Bible lessons, crafts and games.
- The Focus of the year is to establish relationships between Youth and their Prayer Buddies.
- One new activity we did this year was share lunch with each other after church in April.
- The final event was the Buddy Banquet in May, where we celebrated and honored our Prayer Buddies.

## SOCIAL CONCERNS TEAM ANNUAL REPORT 2023-2024

#### **Team Purpose:**

The Social Concerns Ministry Team's purpose is to encourage and support the ministries of social outreach, Christian Care, overall witness, and other ministries as determined.

## **Highlights of Past Year's Activities and Actions:**

## Thanksgiving Ingathering (Chair: Jennifer Parker)

• This project provides Thanksgiving dinners to needy families in Central Ohio through the LSS Food Pantry. The congregation has generously supported this ministry for a number of years. Members are asked to donate bags of food or, because LSS has far more buying power than we do (\$1 = \$5.25), to make cash donations. In November of 2023, members of the congregation donated \$2,404.05 to LSS. The cash donation assisted with the purchase of the needed turkeys and other food items.

## Blessing of the Animals (Chair: Jennifer Parker)

On the first Sunday in October of 2023, Advent held the 29th annual Blessing of the Animals.
Pet parents/siblings brought their dogs, cats, and guinea pigs to be blessed by Pastor Layne.
We had several new attendees who saw the post on Facebook! Those attending the service
as well as other members of the congregation donated numerous cans and bags of dog and
cat food for the LSS Food Pantry.

## God's Work, Our Hands (Chairs: Jennifer Parker and Jean Pontious)

- In conjunction with the ELCA's God's Work, Our Hands weekend (the second weekend in September), the Social Concerns Team asked the congregation to donate items to be included in "blessing bags" for the less fortunate - items such as toothbrushes and toothpaste, deodorant, combs, socks, chap stick, shampoo, hand sanitizer, soap, razors, and shaving cream. The items were packaged in gallon-sized zip-lock bags, along with an insert expressing God's love for the recipient and listing telephone numbers and addresses for the many forms of assistance that are available in the community. The bags were made available for members to distribute. This year we were able to assemble 150 blessing bags as a result of members' donations and two \$250 grants from Thrivent.
- The Team also asked for donations of school supplies, including stuffed backpacks for specific children, which were given to the Church on Oakland Park for distribution.

## □ LWR Quilts: Isabel's Quilters (Chair: Norma Pitts)

- Isabel's Quilters make quilts for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). A quilt is a tangible way to express love and offer support to our neighbors in need, as LWR serves in over 100 countries. Quilts provide shelter from the elements, warmth as bedding or covering, privacy as a door or divider, and comfort and reassurance that others care. LWR reports that these quilts are highly regarded throughout the world because of the quality and consistency of size (60" x 80").
- Team members include Laura Bunch, Jane Hart, Barb Murphy, Norma Pitts, Sylvia Wallace, Brenda Wheeler, and Emily Shipman. Dee Swinehart also machine quilted some of the quilts. The team meets in the home of Brenda and Glenn Sharp where supplies can be stored and elevated tables can remain in place for our work.
- The group met regularly most months, the first and third Tuesdays, to assemble and tie quilts for completion. In between sessions, homework was done to cut fabric squares, design and assemble kits for quilt tops, sew quilt tops and/or sew the bindings to finish quilts. Some vacation times still had some quilt projects being completed.
- Blessing of the Quilts was held on October 8, 2023, in which 52 quilts were displayed on the communion rails and blessed before delivery. On October 13, Brenda Wheeler and Emily Shipman took boxed quilts to an in-gathering at Ohio Gro for shipment to the LWR warehouse for later distribution in other parts of the world where needs are greatest.
- Jane Hart submitted a Thrivent Cares grant form, which was accepted, and we received \$250 to use toward equipment and supplies for our outreach ministry for quilts for LWR. Most of the funds were used to purchase fleece fill.
- Brenda Wheeler and Emily Shipman selected and donated fabric for two quilts---Browns and Bengals—which the group completed for a silent auction to raise funds to support the Youth Gathering 2024. This was held from September to October 8, 2023. In late spring 2024, they put together fabrics to assemble two smaller lap quilts in Christmas theme fabrics for a silent auction in June to benefit the youth. Thanks to Dee Swinehart for quilting and binding the lap quilts. Thanks to the successful and generous bidders!
- Members of the Advent family and friends may participate in this ministry through financial support, providing fabrics for quilt tops, cutting fabric squares, or donating gently used, cleaned unstained queen or king size sheets or other sheets that measure at least 64" x 84". Thanks to all who made contributions this year. Special thanks for many fabrics and threads from the collection of Glenn Sharp's daughter-in-law who passed away and whose family donated to the quilt project. The family of Jane Vollrath also donated some fabrics and quilt tops.

## □ Mitten Tree (Chair: Jennifer Parker)

• A Christmas tree is set up in the Narthex in early December. Members donated dozens of hats, gloves, and scarfs for children. We also received donations from residents of The Forum. This year the items were provided to the Church on Oakland Park for distribution.

## SOUP-ER Bowl of Caring (Chair: Pastor Aaron Layne)

• To raise money for the LSS Food Pantry, the congregation "competed" against Clinton Heights Lutheran Church. Advent raised more funds than Clinton Heights, so Pastor Ralph Wolf had to give a sermon at Advent. Certain key terms in the sermon were chosen by Advent members and kept secret until the sermon was being delivered, much to the enjoyment of all! A total of \$3,783.92 was donated to the Pantry by Advent.

## Bed Brigade (Chair: Trevor Downing)

• The Bed Brigade - - a shared ministry with St. John Lutheran Church in Grove City - - provides beds to families in need while at the same time sharing the love of Jesus Christ. Since its inception, the Bed Brigade has provided over 4000 beds to families in need. This also means 4000 Bibles/Bible storybooks to bed recipients. Today the Bed Brigade builds and delivers roughly 500 beds every year, with Advent delivering roughly 60 of these. Advent has continued to be a regular partner in delivering beds, now on the second Saturday of each month.

## Ongoing Projects

- The Social Concerns Team continues to sponsor the collection of aluminum pop can tabs to support the Ronald MacDonald House and used eyeglasses for donation.
- Throughout the year, members of the congregation donate items for the LSS Food Pantry and place them in the designated bin in the Narthex. The items are then delivered to the Pantry by volunteers.
- We periodically ask the congregation for items to include in Blessing Bags for the less fortunate, with the hope we will have some bags available throughout the year.

#### 2024-2025 Vision Goals:

- Continue to join with the Worship & Witness Team to more effectively fulfill our mission, as both teams share the common goal of "witnessing."
- Recruit volunteers to assist the Church on Oakland Park with their weekly food distribution.
- Continue to look for opportunities to serve others beyond our local congregation.
- Recruit more people to be leaders of, or involved in, each of the ministries and to serve on the Team.

## WORSHIP AND WITNESS TEAM ANNUAL REPORT 2023-2024

#### **Team Purpose**

The Worship and Witness Team's purpose is to glorify God through worship and witness and to serve others through a variety of programs to help those in need in our congregation, our communities, and our world. It encompasses ministries in three key areas: (1) Worship, (2) Witness, and (3) Prayer Chain.

#### Worship and Witness Team Leader: Stacy Bolzenius

#### ADVENT EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH

#### FISCAL YEAR 2025 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

**High Level Overview** – Budget to increase from FY24's \$ 353,800 to \$ 361,500 an increase of \$ 7,700 or slightly more than 2 percent. General Offering to meet the budget will need to increase approximately 2.9 percent principally due to a decline in BEARS lease payments.

**Payroll** is 62.7% of the proposed budget. **Building Costs** are 20.4% of the proposed budget. **Synod & Jacob's Porch Benevolences** are 6.8% of the proposed budget. Total for these three main budget components is 89.9% of the proposed budget. Everything else is approximately 10.1 percent.

## **Comments on Most Significant Changes:**

- **Synod Benevolence** increased by \$ 1,000 annually from \$ 20,000 to \$ 21,000 had been \$ 24,000 pre-pandemic. Maintained and paid in full all years.
- **Children's SS School** doubled budget from \$ 600 to \$ 1,200 in line with current year expenditures.
- Reinstated \$ 1,000 Line Item for Seminarian Support in Parish Life
- Maintenance & Repairs Maintained at a low rate of \$ 10,000 annually thanks to Del Phillips, Michael Deeter, Larry Carpenter, Craig Dame & others for their donated time & labor especially Del for his knowledge & leadership.
- **Property Improvements Accrual** has been adjusted from \$ 15,000 to zero due to the 2023 opening of a \$ 175,000 line of credit with Union Savings Bank. The \$ 15,000 remains in the Operating Budget but now appears as Mortgage Principal & Interest totaling the same \$ 15,000. The May, 2024 balance of our LOC is \$ 21,457.04.
- **Stewardship Expense** reduced from \$ 2,500 to \$ 500 reflecting the conclusion of the Stewardship for All Seasons Synod Program.
- Salaries & Taxes overall increase of \$ 4,200 allocated as follows:
  - PAL an \$ 2,530 increase to the Healthcare Offset component of his Annual Compensation – roughly a 2.9 percent increase. Cumulatively 60.25 percent of the Healthcare Offset will have been restored since Advent assumed responsibility for ELCA/Portico family health insurance – approximately \$30,160 per annum currently.
  - Jean (Organist) a \$ 737 increase to the Organist annual compensation or roughly
     5.6%
  - PAL Healthcare Benefit a \$ 700 increase to reflect an anticipated increase in premiums to be effective January 1, 2025.
  - Employee Payroll Taxes a \$ 233 increase to reflect additional employee taxes and rounding.

**Safety Valve** – our Union Savings Bank LOC requires only interest payments on a monthly basis so we could save roughly \$ 1,000 to \$ 1,100 per month if necessary.
